Course Description

This course will trace the historical forces behind the evolution of soccer in Brazil – from an elite sport to a national passion with unifying powers. Some of the topics explored in the course are: the transition to a slave-free society, immigration, the development of a national identity, urbanization, the military dictatorship, as well as gender divisions and the role of the media and economics behind the popularity of the sport.
